Acrylic Sport Surfacing Cleaning & Maintenace Guide:

1. Keep the court clean.

Maintaining a court in tip-top shape means having to clean it on a regular basis. Why? Because dirt and debris can accumulate over time and can affect playability. So make sure to sweep or vacuum the court regularly. Rinsing the court with a mild solution could also help prevent the growth of mold and mildew. You can purchase water removers and water brooms online at Pickleballcourtsupply.com and other suppliers.

Also, make sure that you remove weeds from the area surrounding the court. Weeds can trap moisture and contribute to mold and mildew growth on the court's surface.

2. Take care of the nets.

If you want to have a good game of pickleball or tennis, then you need to make sure that the net is in top condition as well because the last thing you want is a net that has holes and sags in the wrong places.

To avoid these problems, you should check the nets on a regular basis. You should also only raise the net if you're playing. Be sure to store the nets properly if you won't be using them for quite a while.

3. Address the visible defects in your court.

Maintenance and repair of dilapidated courts can get costly. That's why addressing the visible defects in your pickleball court as soon as possible is essential. For example, if your pickleball court has visible cracks on its surface, you need to repair them right away. Small cracks can get bigger over time. What's worse is that these cracks can make your court vulnerable to water damage.

Fixing minor issues before they get bigger can save you money down the road. When it comes to repairs and maintenance, it's always best to hire professionals, but if you don't have the budget, you can still tackle small tasks yourself.

4. Resurface your court on a regular basis.

The quality of your court's surface can affect the way you play the game. A well-maintained court surface will allow you to hit the ball with more power and help you return the ball more accurately. All sport or recreational courts can wear over time, which is why you need to resurface them periodically. In most cases, court resurfacing can be done every five years.

5. Don't let stains stay too long on your court.

Stains on the court may not be necessarily bad for your game, but they can become unsightly. And if you let stains stay on the court too long, they may become much more difficult to remove later on. In most cases, stains can be removed by scrubbing the affected area with a soft-bristled brush, but if you're dealing with stubborn stains, you may want to consult a professional.

6. Repaint the lines on your court regularly.

Athletic courts, especially the lines, can get worn down from constant foot traffic and ball impacts. If you notice that your lines are starting to look less than perfect, it's time to repaint them.

7. Don't forget to maintain the posts!

Net posts require maintenance as much as the nets do. If you neglect to take care of these items, they'll eventually fall apart. To prevent this from happening, we recommend that you inspect all of your net posts regularly. You should check the posts for damage, such as damaged connections. Also, look for possible signs of rust, mold, or mildew growth.

You may also want to regularly check the posts for signs of water damage, as this could lead to rusting and eventually corrosion of the different parts of the post. Or, if your posts are beyond repair, you can replace them with new ones.

8. Watch out for drainage issues.

Drainage problems can lead to serious damage to your pickleball court. It's essential to watch out for these issues and fix them immediately if they occur. For example, if you find standing water near or within the court, you should remove it immediately. You must also address this problem as soon as possible so that it doesn't keep happening. Neglecting to deal with drainage issues can ruin the court's surface, or worse, it could erode the ground that holds the court.
